Some tips for helping children learn the skill of cooperation:

- Taking turns develops friendships, communication with others and playing games
- Explaining the rules great way to teach self discipline rules
- Verbal rule reminders remind children what to do instead of telling them what not to do
- Model behaviour you want children to follow The more children see adults acting appropriately the more normal it becomes
- Problem solving so children learn to begin to solve their own problems
- Give children choices by giving children choices it helps them feel like they have some power
- Give ideas, not commands This makes children feel they have some control
- Give positive reinforcement Be sure to point out what was done and why it is important
